PaWS Passports

Safe Parking

As we start the new year, we remind everyone to park safely and respectfully. In particular, nobody should park on white zigzag lines in front of the school or in the bus stop where pupils enter the school. Parking here blocks the view for pupils and parents as well as the approaching traffic at very busy times.

As a community we all have a duty of care for each other and dangerous parking is putting children at risk. Nobody wants to be responsible for a road traffic accident involving one of our pupils.

We run a walking both from both the castle car park and Mortain Road to reduce the need to come onto the High Street. Parking permits are freely available for the castle car park at any time from the school office.
